FOR SIXTY YEARS

BARNABUS PHINNEY LIVED ON ONE FARM.

Death Claims Another Franklin County Pioneer—Sketch of the Aged Man.

Another Franklin county pioneer is dead.

Barnabus Phinney, esq., aged 85, died Sunday at his home two miles north of the city, and the funeral will be conducted by Chaplain W. R. Parsons, at the family residence Tuesday. The cause of his death was due to the infirmities of age.

Mr. Phinney was a son of Calvin and Thankful Phinney and was born

April 3, 1813, in the town of Lee, Berkshire county, Mass. He was 85 years 9 months and 25 days old when he died. When four years of age he removed with his parents to Apulia, N. Y. Later they moved to Medina county, Ohio. In his 25th year he moved to Franklin county, to the farm where he has since resided. November 4, 1843, he married Miss Mary H. Smiley, daughter of Colonel William Smiley, and they had lived in holy wedlock for 56 years. They celebrated their golden wedding October 31, 1892. Mr. Phinney was the second of six children; two sons and four daughters, of which but one survives him, Mrs. Almira Wheelock, of McGrawsville, New York.

Until he was over 80 years old he was in the enjoyment of good health. In 1893 he was stricken with paralysis and this was followed by other attacks of the same malady. With age and suffering he found the love and care of his dear wife and kindred all

They were not blessed with children of their own, but took care of a number belonging to their kindred. These they educated and gave their devoted love and care, and they live to remember them with grateful affection.

Mr. Phinney was a beautiful example of good nature, industry, cheerful hospitality and broad brotherly charity. He improved his early opportunities for study and the discipline of his intellectual faculties. He commanded the respect and esteem of all who knew him. Mr. Phinney belonged to the old colonial stock of New England, a people who have fixed their stamp upon the social habits, ideas and usages of the great northwest. For years no man was better known in this city, though most of his friends of his youth have passed away.

A Remarkable Accident.

A remarkable accident befell Mr. Charles S. Sprague, of 66 East Fourth avenue, early Saturday evening. He was riding north on High street on his wheel. When a short distance north of Gay street he was run over by a Wells-Fargo express wagon, which had a total weight on of 2,700 pounds. The wheels passed diagonally over both of his legs. The driver, Mr. John B. Walter, who is a warm personal friend of Mr. Sprague's, thought he had run over his head, and was hence very much surprised when he got up, mounted his wheel and rode home. The doctor did not think the injuries would prove very serious, but they will confine Mr. Sprague to his house for several days. The mystery was that no bones were found to have been broken.

Buckeye Republican Club.

At the session of the Buckeye Republican club last Saturday night it was voted to give the rooms to the Republican city committee for its meeting next Saturday, when the date for the primaries is to be fixed. It seems to be the idea to have a long campaign. Heretofore the spring campaigns have only been about two weeks long, but at the club meeting last Saturday evening the talk was that the primaries would be held February 17 or 18.
